Father Patrick Mulhern 1939-2006

A tribute by Rebecca Rakoczy

The St. Thomas More School community lost a beloved friend and pastoral leader when Father Patrick Mulhern passed away Nov. 29, 2006.

For many alumni, Father Pat was their “first” priest; arriving at the church and school in 1987, he shepherded STM through a period of rapid growth until he left in early 2000 after becoming ill.

Although he has not served officially at STM for more than six years, memories of Father Pat include his voluminous robes engulfing his lanky frame, flapping behind him as he strode down the church aisle, with those stubborn cowlicks of white hair sticking up on his head, like a schoolboy. Extremely well-read, he loved Shakespeare and the *New York Times*, but was famous for getting off-track in his homilies. He was acutely aware of his foibles, and his humility and self-deprecating humor were endearing.

If you lived in Decatur, you also knew Father Pat as the man working in the church front lawn, watering flowers, pulling up hoses, often wearing an old sweater and sneakers, his pants a bit too short for his stature; his glasses (which he forever was famously misplacing) perched haphazardly on his craggy nose,

or pushed through his hair. Or you saw him running around town. Jogging was a favorite pastime for Father Pat, and that love led to the annual More Fest and Father Pat 5 K run, a community-wide tradition that still goes on today.

When a black puppy of indeterminate parentage was left at the rectory one day, Father Pat was “forced” to adopt it. Paddy became his constant companion, following him around and even sitting (discreetly) by when parishioners came into his office for confessions.

As a young child, my daughter Sean called Father Pat “the Godfather.” Although I’m sure it was because she saw him as the “God” figure in church, the moniker was amusingly appropriate. Never a threatening figure, Father Pat was still able to get the congregation to do his bidding with just a “look and a gentle demand couched as a question. “You will be there, won’t you?” he would say. We always obeyed his “requests.”

There was no question Father Pat loved God, and he embraced those who shared his passion for the Lord and for “Jesus work”; enlarging our community by helping those in need. He was Jesus as the common man; embodying a spirituality and love that cut through everyday clutter and pretense. He saw the Lord’s Supper as a great celebration, a way to welcome people into God’s love, and he embraced it – as he embraced us – even when he sometimes forgot your name.

During his funeral – which was a packed house – fellow Dubliner and All Hallow’s seminarian classmate Msgr. John Delaney remembered Father Pat as famously disorganized and absent-minded even as a young man; but also acutely witty. Striding across the stage the night before the group said their final ordination vows, Pat belted out the *My Fair Lady* tune, “I’m Getting Married in the Mornin’.”

It was classic “Father Pat.”

Students who walk into “Mulhern Hall” today probably never knew the man, but his welcoming spirit will forever be a part of this place.

God bless you always, Father Pat. Watch over us.



THE COW CALLS - STM RESPONDS

Chick-fil-A Downtown Decatur launched a campaign in early December with the goal of providing meals to needy people in the Decatur area during the Christmas Season. Chick-fil-A Downtown Decatur recognized what a blessed people we are and wanted to “give back” to our local community during the holidays.

They implemented the C.O.W. (Communities Offering Warmwishes) holiday program to help needy families. Their goal was to put a Chick-fil-A boxed meal into the hands of 2,000 people! To show their appreciation, Ms. Crays and the Chick-fil-A Cow made a personal visit to our school in mid-January and presented every student a coupon for a free kids meal.

ANNUAL FUND

The school shares the responsibility with the church for paying the loan on the multipurpose building. The majority of the funds raised in the Annual Fund are applied to the school’s portion of this loan payment. If we reach or exceed our goal, then 20% of the total amount raised goes directly back into the school towards the purchase of flat-panel monitors for the computer lab as well as a playground for the field.

The Annual Fund is our effort to raise enough money every year to help offset the school’s expenses and keep the increase in tuition at a minimum.

STM'S ROBOTICS TEAM WINS FIRST PLACE IN ATLANTA REGIONAL OF THE FIRST LEGO LEAGUE COMPETITION

On Saturday, December 2, the STM Robotics team competed in the Atlanta Regional of the First Lego League National Robotics Competition. The team "brought home the gold", finishing in First Place overall. In addition, the STM team earned the right to represent Greater Atlanta in the State Competition, which was held on January 20 at Georgia Tech.

The STM team is named N.E.R.D.S., an acronym for **Never Ending Robotic Destruction Systems**. The N.E.R.D.S. team competed in four categories: Robot Performance, Technical Presentation, Research

Presentation, and Teamwork. The team had eight weeks to design, build, program, test, and compete with a custom autonomous robot.

Our team is part of a Robotics Program that includes an after-school program for Intermediate Grades and an elective course for Middle School students. The programs strengthen skills in critical thinking and problem solving. Students are introduced to machine design, drivetrain design, electricity and electronics, programming logic, teamwork, and delivering deadlines.
